In this edition, we encourage you to adopt the PACE (Probe, Alert, Challenge, Emergency) system, which improves group decision-making. Let us know what you think about this system – we'd be delighted to hear if this helps you and your teams on board. And we're always keen to receive your incident and near-miss reports that help others learn from your experiences too.
